The term culture industry (German: Kulturindustrie) was coined by the critical theorists Theodor Adorno (1903-1969) and Max Horkheimer (1895-1973), and was presented as critical vocabulary in the chapter "The Culture Industry: Enlightenment as Mass Deception", of the book Dialectic of Enlightenment (1947), wherein they proposed that popular culture is akin to a factory producing standardized cultural goods—films, radio programmes, magazines, etc.—that are used to manipulate mass ...

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Culture Industry Reconsidered(German: Résumé über Kulturindustrie), was written in 1963 by Theodor W.
